Learn about dementia at Shepparton event

There are currently an estimated 400,000 people living with dementia in Australia. Without a significant medical breakthrough, this number is expected to increase to more than double that in the next 25 years.

Murray PHN is presenting a free event in Shepparton during the Victorian Seniors Festival on Wednesday 11 October for community members interested in learning more about dementia.

The festival focuses on providing free or low-cost events and activities across the month of October, designed to bring seniors together to enjoy themselves, learn new skills and make new friends.

Delivered by Dementia Australia, the community event is suitable for people living with dementia, carers, family members and people who are concerned they or someone they know may have dementia.

Event attendees will learn about types of dementia, signs and symptoms; the experience of living with dementia; available services and where to access support.

Murray PHN CEO Matt Jones said that while dementia is the second leading cause of death of Australians, there are things we can do to try and reduce our risk of getting it.

“Even though we can’t change getting older, our genetics or family history, research suggests that changing certain health and lifestyle habits may make a significant difference to reducing or delaying the risk of developing dementia,” said Mr Jones. “We hope that everyone who attends this event takes away some information about dementia and the supports available to them.”
